While monitoring, Katie has been able to see the unique variety of wildlife that our area has to offer, including: moose, elk, deer, coyotes, otters, muskrats, a black bear (most recent), sandhill cranes, blue herons, red-tailed hawks, bald eagles, golden eagles, long-billed curlew, and short-eared owls!





LRLT currently holds 13 conservation easements (CEs) and 4 fee title properties. There are specific

monitoring photo points that are monitored each year to ensure the terms of the CEs are met by taking photos and completing a written monitoring report. Our Stewardship Coordinator, Katie Berasi, is in charge of making sure that these get done every year. So far this year, she has finished 9 of the CEs
